



## Wild Bird Trust Accessibility Statement

The Wild Bird Trust (WBT) Nature House is located at Maplewood Flats in North Vancouver, within the traditional and unceded territory of the Tsleil-Waututh Nation.

### Getting to Maplewood Flats

Maplewood Flats is approximately five bus stops from Phibbs Exchange and is accessible via the 212 and 215 routes. The site is located on the south side of Dollarton Highway, facing Burrard Inlet. Return to Phibbs Exchange/westbound will require crossing unregulated traffic to access the bus stop.

There is limited parking available on site. A small number of priority parking spaces are available, **by request**, for visitors who require them. You can request parking spaces by contacting [help@wildbirdtrust.org](mailto:help@wildbirdtrust.org) or 604-929-2379. Overflow parking is located west of the main lot, directly adjacent to the entrance. The overflow parking is loose gravel with potholes and the path from overflow parking to the Flats is not accessible for mobility devices.

### Accessing the Nature House

The Nature House is a prominent grey two-story building. To access the Nature House from the entrance of Maplewood Flats, go beyond the far end of the parking lot onto a compact gravel path, and arrive at the building on your left. To enter the Nature House, enter through the large glass doors that are situated directly behind the building's wooden welcome posts. The entrance is accessible via a paved ramp in the front.

### Washrooms

Two public washrooms are located just to the left of the main entrance, accessible via side doors. Each washroom includes a wide stall; however, please note that these stalls do not currently have support bars and the doors do not have push button activation.
